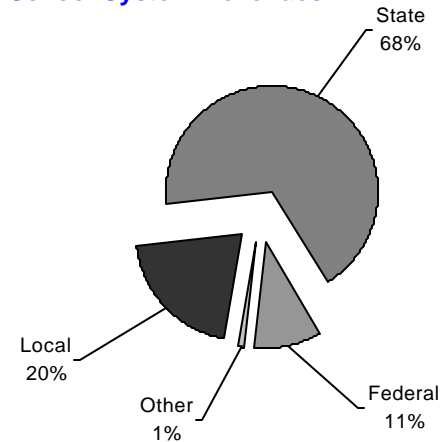

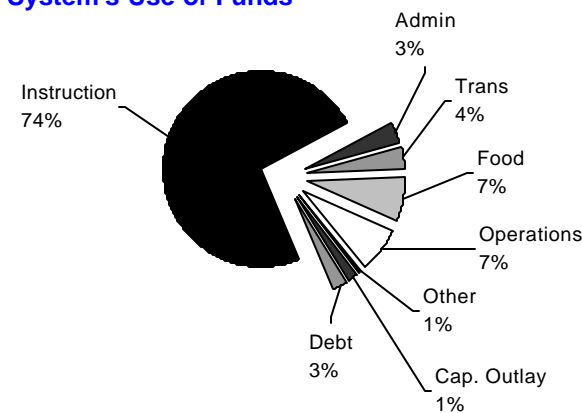

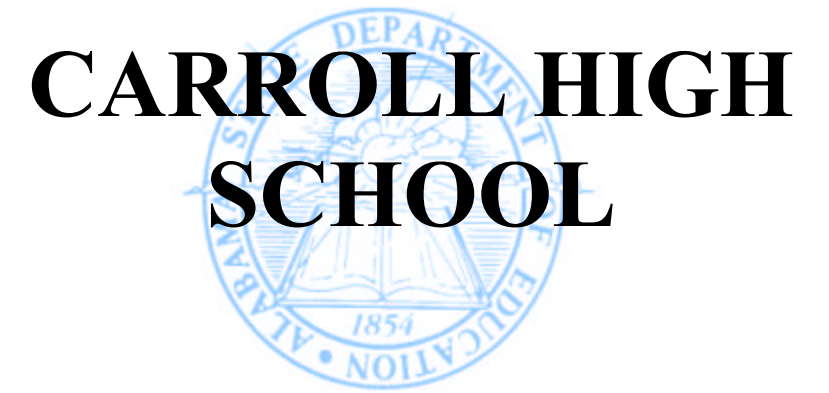
The chart below shows the spending per student for this school system. The letter grade compares the system's per student spending to the state, southeast, and nation.

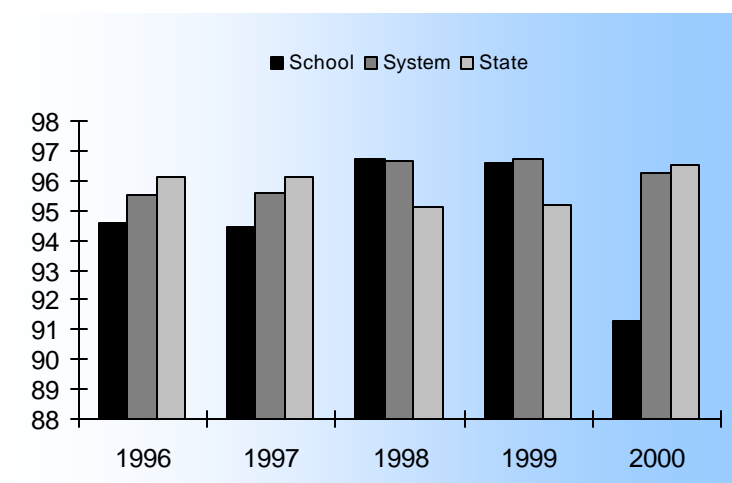
