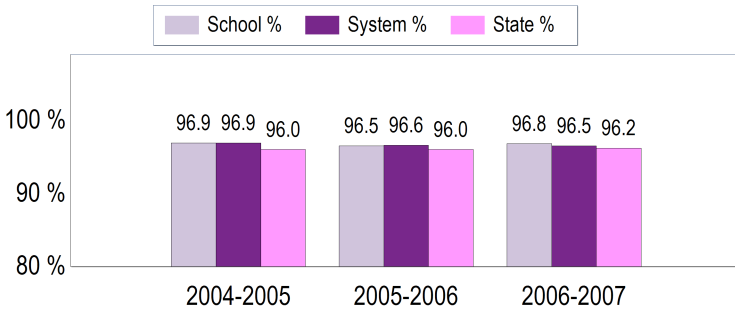

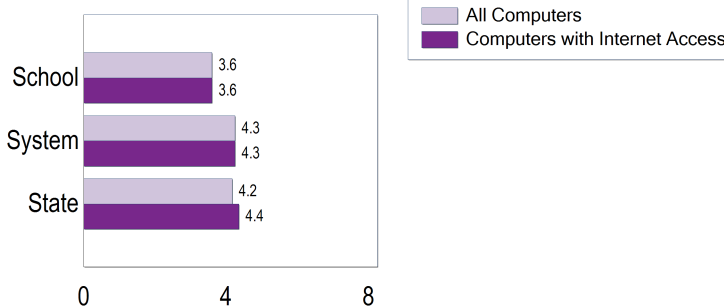
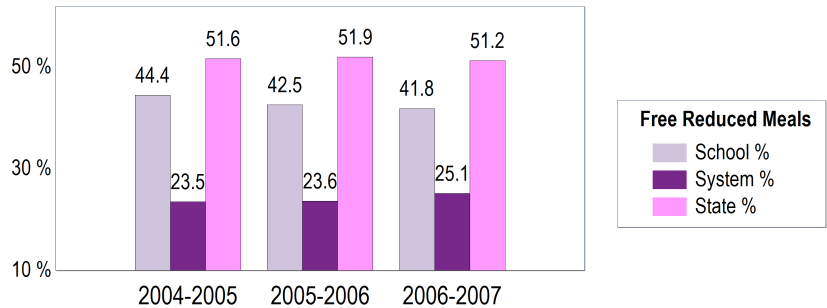


Average Daily Attendance

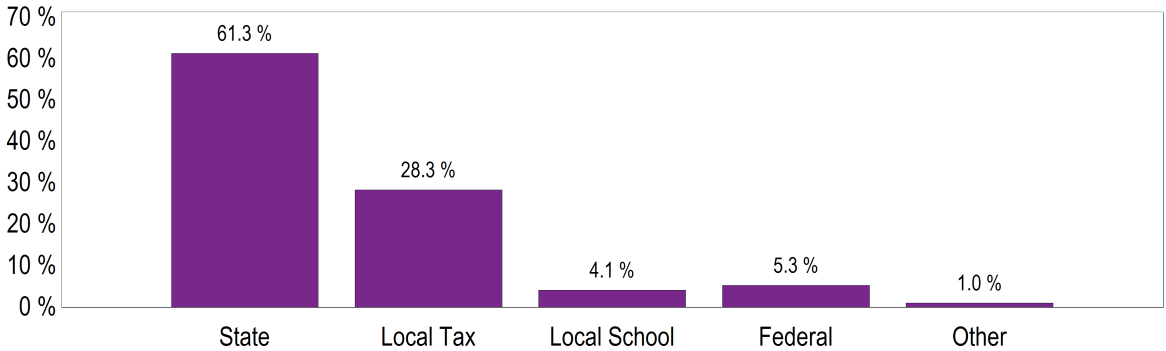

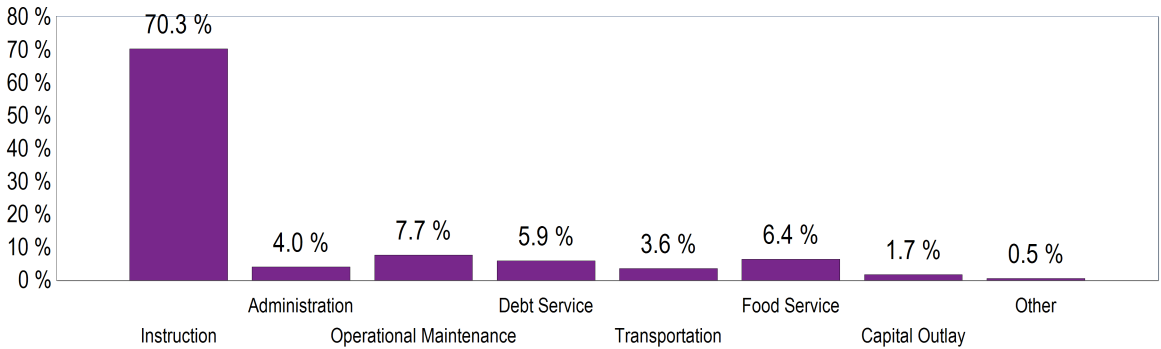
Total 2005-2006 Fiscal Year Revenue = \$25,245,556.13
